

THE PAST CONTINUOUS IN THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE EXPLAINED WITH EXERCISES.



Study this example situation:



Yesterday Vanessa and Marcus played tennis. They started at 17 o'clock and finished at 18.00.


So, at 17.30 they **were playing** tennis.

They **were playing** = they were in the middle of playing. They had not finished playing.

Was/were -ing is the past continuous:

I/he/she/it | **was** | **playing**
we/you/they | **were** | **playing**

I was doing something = I was in the middle of doing something at a certain time. The action or situation had already started before this time, but had not finished:



Some examples:

This time last year I **was living** in Turkey.

What **were** you **doing** at 12 o'clock last night?

I waved to Sarah, but she **wasn't looking**.

Compare the past continuous (I was doing) and past simple (I did):

Past continuous (in the middle of an action)

- I **was walking** home when I met Judy. (in the middle of walking home)
- James **was watching** TV when we arrived.

Past simple (complete action)

- I **walked** home after the party last night. (= all the way, completely)
- James **watched** television a lot when he was ill last year.

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We often use the past simple and the past continuous together to say that something happened in the middle of something else:

Jake **phoned** while we **were having** lunch.

It **was raining** when I **got** up.

I **saw** you in the park yesterday. You **were sitting** on the grass and **reading** a book.

I **hurt** my back while I **was working** in the garden.

But we use the past simple to say that one thing happened after another:

I **was walking** along the road when I **saw** Dan. So I **stopped**, and we **had** a chat.

Compare:

When James arrived, we **were having** dinner. (= we had already started before she arrived)

When James arrived, we **had** dinner. (= James arrived, and then we had dinner)

Some verbs (for example, know and want) are not normally used in the continuous.

We were good friends. We **knew** each other well. (not We were knowing)

I was enjoying the party, but Ken **wanted** to go home. (not was wanting)
